In late August, senior Sophia Speece was on a family vacation out west with her parents and five sisters (including three other SAA students). Sophia was looking forward to all the perks of being a senior.

Meanwhile, Dean of Faculty Dr. Sean Monahan was more than a month into twiceweekly meetings with Dane County officials preparing extensive safety protocols for SAA to reopen September 8.

From his professional experience with coronaviruses from years in the pharmaceutical industry, Dr. Monahan knew the necessary steps to effectively carry out all public health recommendations. SAA was ready to operate in-person.

Then, on Friday, August 21 at 5:15 p.m., Dane County issued Emergency Order #9, closing all county schools. The news overshadowed the remainder of Sophia's vacation. She resigned herself to the idea of long hours in front of a computer screen, competing with her sisters and parents – who have been working remotely – for a quiet place in a busy home. "I was sad and anxious," Sophia remembered.

It was time for SAA to act. After hearing from many families in the immediate wake of the news from Dane County, "We had to fight for the rights of our families and their children," recalled SAA Executive Director Joan Carey.

In a matter of hours, board members, staff and parent volunteers mobilized to act. SAA was

determined to support parents' decisions to provide their children with the most stable and secure option for their children considering their individual circumstances. Whether in-person or distance learning, the Academy was prepared to give students what they needed to flourish. If daycares could operate according to county guidelines, why couldn't schools like SAA?

The Academy's leadership turned to attorneys Misha Tseytlin and Kevin LeRoy, who advised an appeal directly to the Wisconsin Supreme Court to challenge the order and expedite reopening school.

Joan explained, "The attorneys guided us every step of the way: collaborating with other Catholic schools and plaintiff parents to demonstrate the harmful consequences of the Dane County order; finalizing robust reopening plans that would withstand the scrutiny of the court; and writing our affidavits."

Within 48 hours of announcing SAA's legal challenge, the school raised a remarkable \$110,000 through a crowdfunding site. Gifts came in from across the country and even internationally as people rallied around the cause. In God's providence, this amount will exactly cover the legal expenses it took to get to this point, as the attorneys intend to cover any further fees due to the importance of this civil rights issue.

"[More than 850] donors wanted to be a part of the effort to restore to parents the right to decide what's best for their children, rather than letting an entire generation of kids be put in front of computer screens all day long, five days a week," added Joan.



On Thursday, September 10, the Supreme Court granted an injunction, allowing SAA to open for classes in-person on Monday, September 14. Oral arguments for the case will begin on December 8. For more information on the lawsuit, visit: ambroseacademy.org/openschool.

Dr. Monahan is overjoyed to be back in the classroom, and he's not the only one. "The faculty are thrilled to be back with the students because we know this is a better mode of education. It's who we are," he said.

Sophia added that a favorite part of being back is that students can "resume Socratic dialogue and build off each other's arguments in a class discussion." Senior year is looking up for her and her peers.

Thanks to the protocols developed by Dr. Monahan's team and the grassroots support, the students of SAA are back in the classroom! One could feel a palpable joy that first day back as teachers and students reveled in simply being in the same space, even at a distance, as their colleagues and peers.

As the Academy continues to follow the county's guidelines in order to provie the priceless gift of a Catholic education, we give thanks to God for all those who rallied together. Because of this collaboration, parents – not just at SAA, but across the county – now can choose the best options for their children's total well-being and education.
