

Fellow alumni, school families, and staff in attendance rejoiced with Fr. Now, Fr. Robert is assigned to the Opus Dei Center in Irving, Texas, offering the sacraments and spiritual direction to families and young people there and drawing on his own formation at St. Ambrose: "My St. Ambrose formation gave me the deep conviction that faith and reason are inseparable, enabling me to navigate all the intellectual challenges of my university studies, ending up with a stronger faith and deeper desire to serve the kingdom of Jesus Christ."

After reverting to his Catholic faith when he came to St. Ambrose Academy as a Freshman, Sam Glanville (Class of 2024) relished the vibrant Catholic community at school. He recalls Dr. John Joy entertaining tough questions from students in Religion class, including why Jesus had to die for us on the cross. Dr. Constance Nielsen guided lively discussions of papal encyclicals like Pope St. Paul VI's Humanae Vitae.

When Sam moved onto the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus, he carried this formation with him and thirsted for a new vibrant Catholic community. Sam has made his home at the St. Paul University Catholic Center, compassionately answering questions for his peers, like why Jesus had to die for us on the cross. Thanks, Dr. Joy! In fact, a St. Paul's intern tapped Sam to become a Bible study leader for 2025–2026 because of Sam's knowledge of and love for the faith.

Those encyclicals from high school are also helping Sam in his biomedical engineering classes now. Sam explained, "My love for the human being and for assisting others came from the classroom with Dr. Joy and Dr. Nielsen, going through documents such as *Humanae Vitae* and discussing the human person and how, as Christians, we are to love every individual."

There is a real-world application in his recent group project to create a device that would connect a wheelchair and a stroller for a disabled client. "The reason why I felt so passionate about this project and helping this woman gain some semblance of normalcy was because I was reading those documents and discussing the dignity of the individual and talking about Catholic social teaching." Although Sam's coursework is tough and his schedule, including activities at St. Paul's, is grueling, he is turning to the Lord for the grace to persevere in his faith life and his academic career.

Even before he graduated from the University of Minnesota-Twin Cities, he had his foot in the door at Anchor Group as an intern, having heard about this incredible majority-Catholic NetSuite consulting company through his older brother, Ben.

The Catholic culture there – particularly the Brotherhood of St. Joseph – hasn't disappointed as Sam and his colleagues use their daily "Growth Hour" to pray together, build relationships through weekly small groups, and plan the altar they intend to build together for the office chapel.

"It is important to cut through the emotion and figure out logically what has happened. Being able to think logically and to communicate my premises and my conclusions clearly has been essential." He credits Dr. Constance Nielsen and her Cycle 1 Logic class for outfitting him for success at this kind of critical thinking.

He added, "Through the foundation I gained from Miss Klinkhammer, I am able to put a Christian lens on my work, which helps in a Catholic company and culture. I'm able to look at situations which frustrate me but I can still interact with love."




